- 4. Essays (or parts of essays) for coursework or for examination practice
- 5. Preparation for speaking and listening assessments

How can parents help

- Test them on key terminology spelling and understanding.
- For longer pieces of writing, for example, coursework or examination essays, ask them to talk the plan through with you. Remind them that 5-10 minutes spent planning can result in a higher grade.
- Encourage them to proof-read their work.
- Listen to their individual talks and ask them questions that require them to develop their ideas further.

• Ask them to show you in their essays where they have met the requirements of the mark scheme in order to get their target grade.

MATHEMATICS FACULTY

- 1. Researching a topic for self study and enrichment
- 2. Consolidate classroom learning through further examples including past papers

How can parents help

- Encourage a positive and "can do" attitude towards mathematics.
- Read through questions with your child and encourage them to pick out information needed to answer it.
- Provide your child with revision guide and help them plan their revision.
- Encourage them to talk through topics and explain what they are currently covering. (Let them teach you!)
- Look at your child's work on a regular basis so that you can see progress of your child.
- Help your child if you can but please annotate any help given by writing a note/comment in their exercise book.
- Ensure students have correct equipment for lessons that include: natural display scientific calculator, pair of compasses, protractor, ruler and books (and know how to use them!)
- Ensure your child catches up on any work missed.

• Functional Skills: Get your child to relate Mathematics to real life eg:percentages and best buys in shops. Any DIY projects get your child to estimate and measure. Read paper/watch news for interest rates.

How can parents help with GCSE Art?

- Take them to a gallery or museum, locally or in London, or if away on holiday
- Check the newspapers and the web to see what is on and if it might be appropriate to enrich their learning,

- Research tasks (for example, finding the stimuli and content for a devised piece
- Recording practical work to support Section A 1a-d of written examination paper
- Practising past questions

Examples of extension tasks

- Practising past questions, and self mark and/or submit for marking
- Researching contextual information about their scripted piece e.g. past production images, consider set & costume ideas
- Compiling a character profile for the character being played
- Reading other scripts by the playwright of a text being studied or performed
- Reading 'around the subject' (for example, reading about theatre practitioners such as Stanislavski)

How can parents help

Typical tasks for GCSE MUSIC

- Rehearse/ practice for a forthcoming Solo or Ensemble performance
- Further development of/ completion of compositional technique exercise
- Research a topic area or genre in support of current area of study
- Research a topic area or genre in preparation for new area of study
- Planning and delivering a presentation (e.g. presentation for the class on your instrument)
- Research a particular composer or artist and create a fact file on this person
- Responding to set questions on areas of study
- Completion of theory-based worksheets

• Complete a listening task for your Listening Diary (in support of current or new area of study, or as revision)

Learn key vocabulary and Italian musical terms

Examples of extension tasks

- Encourage use of internet to research around the areas of study and the specific set works
- Encourage use of YouTube to assist wide variety of listening experiences

How can parents help

- Listen to and encourage them in their practising
- Ask them for a performance to be presented in front of family and friends at home

How can parents help

• Students are issued with detailed booklets for all units of study. Please familiarise yourself with these and monitor the completion of activities.

- Engage in discussion with the student about different ethical issues.

- Help monitor time restrictions when necessary.

How can parents help with Btec Technology

- Encourage an enquiring mind towards Buildings and Construction
- Discuss with your child their work and asking them to explain the principles of what they are trying to achieve.
- Discuss with them what you are thinking if you are considering any alterations to your home or if you have a relative or friend that might be.

• Discuss with them real life issues and the cause and effect of Construction. An example might be a major development in your area that may take away some local amenity. People need houses but why build them there?

Typical tasks for GCSE FOOD TECHNOLOGY

• Internet based research to find out the name, cost and main ingredients of a range of food products e.g. salads, cakes or to find suitable recipes.

- Preparing ingredients for a practical food session.
- Learning and practising for written tests.
- Completing examination questions

- Encourage students to visit food outlets and supermarkets, to raise awareness of products, costs and packaging.
- Encourage students to cook healthy dishes on a regular basis and practice assessed work.
- Ask students when they are cooking and then provide them with the ingredients.
- Discuss the outcome of practical work completed at school, including any written feedback required.

Typical tasks for GCSE CATERING

- Planning practical tasks, purchase and preparation of ingredients.
- Written evaluation of practical work.
- Use of internet for researching recipes, food products, catering outlets etc.,
- Learning for written tests.
- Completing past exam questions relevant to the current topic.

Examples of extension tasks

- Encourage them to try out recipes at home prior to assessment tasks etc.,
- Get them to watch cookery programmes on TV and read food magazines/newspaper articles.

• Encourage them to think of ways of improving the skills base of the items they make in order to improve grades.

How can parents help with GCSE Catering?

- Encourage students to cook regularly at home and discuss the outcome.
- To cook complete meals not just individual dishes.
- Introduce more unusual/seasonal ingredients in the food they prepare so students have a wider understanding of the subject.
- Ask students when they are cooking, then provide them with the ingredients necessary for the task set.
- Check homework tasks are completed on time.
- Encourage visiting local food outlets and supermarkets to raise awareness of products, cots and quality of service.

Typical tasks for BTEC HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE

- Use feedback sheets to make amendments to assessed tasks.
- Complete assessed tasks as directed on the assignment briefs.
- Research different examined topic areas (eg: using websites, TV documentaries)
- Complete examples of examination questions.

• Examples of extension tasks

- Additional research using
 - Magazines Books
 - Internet
- Watch suggested Health & Social Care documentaries.

How can parents help with BTEC HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE

• Read through and discuss the task and feedback with your child so they understand what they need to do.

- Go through the task sheet and assessment criteria to help them plan.
- Read through the course textbook and revision guides with your child to ensure they

understand the key ideas and concepts (you could test them for example).

Typical tasks for GCSE ICT

- 1. Know ICT terminology and be able to give clear and technical definitions.
- 2. Practise questions from examination papers.
- 3. Become conversant with examination mark schemes.
- 4. Rework responses to questions for higher marks.

How can parents help with GCSE ICT?

- Help them by proofreading their coursework, and by improving their formatting of work.
- Help by marking their practice questions, according to the mark schemes.
- Ensure that they have access to satisfactory ICT devices at home.
- Ensure that a variety of information sources are used when gathering research and that the validity of the information gathered is accurate.

Typical tasks for BTEC ICT

- Use feedback sheet to make amendments to coursework tasks
- Complete coursework tasks as directed in the assignment booklet
- Ensure that portfolio is complete and organised

Examples of extension tasks

- Practise skills learnt in practical lessons, using examples provided in lesson
- Do additional research using magazines, books and internet to further development and research

How can parents help with BTEC ICT?

• Read through and discuss the task and feedback with your child so they understand what they need to do.

• Go through the task sheet and assessment criteria to help them plan.

• Read through the course textbook and revision guides with your child to ensure they understand the key ideas and concepts (you could test them for example).

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Typical tasks for GCSE PHYSICAL EDUCATION

- Planning training programme activities.
- Applying knowledge learnt in the lesson to practical situations.
- Past paper questions.
- Learning key words and definitions.
- Revising for written tests.

Examples of extension tasks

- Practise skills learnt in practical lessons, using examples provided in lesson.
- Pupils are encourage to take part in extracurricular activities, which includes joining clubs outside of the school environment.
- Do additional research using magazines, books and internet to further development and research.

How can parents help

- Encourage an enquiring mind towards sport and the media.
- Discuss with your child their work and asking them to explain the principles of what they are trying to achieve.
- Discuss relevant issues in sport and the media. Example could be who should host the next Olympics and why?

• Encourage your child to get actively involved in sport and activities to promote a healthy lifestyle.

Typical tasks for BTEC SPORT

- Use feedback sheet to understand the amendments that are needed for coursework tasks
- Ensure that portfolio is organised.
- Review class notes to consolidate understanding before completing tasks.

Examples of extension tasks

- Additional research on each topics to improve understanding.
- Analyse each units to identify the links between each topic.
- Focus on the grading criteria to individually identify personal targets.

How can parents help

- Read through and discuss the task and feedback with your child so they understand what they need to do.
