Comments

- Students participated in both the Purple Pathway (including the Reading Plus programmes). All actions were completed prior to lockdown in March. Data at the end of academic year was not collected, so the data above is from February 2020. We would have expected all students to be on their flight path by the end of the academic year.
- The Reading Plus Software has been adopted by the school for all students who need to catch up in the 2020/21 academic year and additional supported sessions are being organised to support and track them.
- Without Key Stage 2 SATs test data, a detailed review of the NGRT and Vernon testing will be completed to identify students requiring additional support and who are not included as part of the Purple Pathway.
