From the Headteacher

We are already nearly at the end of a half term – it comes around very quickly! We have achieved a great deal this half term as you can see from the two Newsblasts and the website. There have been some great trips: the geography field trips and the Year 12 Physics trip to CERN to name but two and the Careers Seminars are, once again, a



huge success. We have also had two sets of Parents' Evenings with over 90% turn out. Thank you for your support, it makes such a difference.

Critical Incident Planning

The safety of students, and indeed all those on site, is of paramount importance to us. We regularly review our procedures for dealing with events which may put people at risk – including fire, flood, intruders on site, gas leaks. We refer to these events as 'critical incidents'.

Part of our review process is to carry out evacuation drills and also drills where we feel the best course of action is to keep students and staff inside a building either until the danger has passed or prior to evacuating away from the school. We will be carrying out one of these 'lockdown drills' after half term.

If a real critical incident were to occur, we would update parents via text, email and/or social media or the website as frequently as possible as events progress and subject to advice from the emergency services. In these circumstances, it will be important to keep lines of communication open and we would ask parents not to ring in or come to the school at that time.

During the drill we will **NOT** be contacting all parents. Below is a copy of the information we will go through with students explaining the drill. It would be very helpful if you could go through this with them so they are prepared for the drill but also understand its purpose.


In the event of a fire alarm you all know exactly what to do - you go to the tennis courts calmly and without a fuss and wait in the tutor groups in silence. We also need to practise what we would do if we ever needed to keep you safe inside the school. This might be because of a gas leak, a dog on the loose or a dangerous intruder. This situation is called "lock down". In the event of a lock down we will send a message to all staff by email and text and a notice will pop up on computers and whiteboards. We will ask teachers to close doors and windows but otherwise lessons should carry on as normal until further instructions are sent or there is an all clear message. Staff may also ask that you put your mobile phones on the desk as it is important that we keep lines of communication clear, or we may ask you to switch them off. We will be having a practice drill one day this week. This should not affect your lesson but you will be aware that something is going on.

At Maiden Erlegh we are working hard to promote how important it is to have a Growth Mindset by encouraging students to look at their successes in relation to their effort, and to think about skills which they haven't learnt YET! At home, you can support this simply by thinking about the language you use in everyday discussions. Instead of "You solved that problem really quickly, you are so smart", use "You solved that problem really quickly, you must have worked really hard at that".

Instead of "Don't worry that you didn't get it this time, you're good at other subjects", use "Don't worry that you didn't get it this time, if you keep trying, you'll get there soon".

School Funding

As I am sure you are aware, the Government is undertaking а consultation on the funding of schools and the move to a National Funding Formula. The consultation is not yet closed and so the final outcome, and its impact on Maiden Erlegh Trust is not confirmed, however, the information provided in the consultation suggests a further decrease in budget available to the school. We were fortunate to receive additional funding when we first became an academy and this was used to support various capital investments across the school, including the refurbishment of the Humanities block. Since then we have seen a gradual reduction in our real term funding, along with other schools, and this is something we have been managing for the last few years and will continue to manage going forward.

We remain very concerned about education funding generally, especially its failure to keep pace with inflation and the additional cost pressures being put upon schools. We are also very concerned about how any further reductions may compromise some of what Maiden Erlegh School has traditionally been able to offer. Please let me reassure you, however, that the governors and I will continue to strive to protect the quality education which *is so valued* by parents, students and staff.


