From the Headteacher



In education we spend a lot of time focusing on what we can do to make things better and to progress a little more. Those reflections are important, but it is essential also to remind ourselves of our strengths and of everything that has gone well.

We started the term with tremendous examination results. Our sixth formers

performed very well and our Progress 8 score for Year 11, of +0.65, puts us in line with the top 12% of schools nationally. And all of this with new courses in all year groups.

Over the course of the term, our new students have settled into their respective year groups exceptionally well, and participation by all students in clubs, squads, music and drama groups, after school activities, competitions and trips is tremendous. I think this aspect of school life should never be underestimated. There is much consideration at the moment, quite rightly, about wellbeing, and we know that students who participate in the whole of school life, make more friends, feel more integrated and so feel happier. This clearly has a hugely positive impact on their wellbeing, but also their performance in examinations.

I want also to commend our students who have represented our values so well outside school, whether on the sports field, on trips and visits or in and around the community. I frequently get emails and calls from members of the public who praise our students –

I recently received one from a Canadian gentleman who had met one of our students on a plane and was so impressed, he felt compelled to write!

> This academic year we have over 40 trips or residentials planned ranging from sports tournaments, theatre trips, gallery viewings, STEM visits and fun trips too. All these are organised and led voluntarily by staff, often in their own time, and I must thank them for their commitment to providing such an enrichment programme. Next term some of our sixth formers will visit CERN and others will take part in work experience in France – and of course our skiers will start their preparation for the Easter trip.

Bike and House Security

The Earley Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) have asked us to remind you of some simple actions which can help protect bikes, or retrieve them on the rare occasion they are lost or stolen:

- Make a note of the ID number of the Bike. This can be found by turning the bike upside down and taking a photo of the ID number on the frame.
- Ensure you have a good quality padlock.

The police say that they are often found but cannot be returned to their owners as they cannot be identified.

They also say that at this time of year there tends to be more burglaries and so it is important to keep side gates and back doors locked, as burglars seem to favour this for entry into homes.

3D Printing has arrived in the Design & Technology Department

To support 3D printing, we are recommending that all design and technology students download a free programme called 'Google SketchUp', the make version not the pro version.









We are excited to see how Year 9 and 10 have started to develop their design work using Google SketchUp, giving a much clearer 3D view and prototyping opportunities for their work. Congratulations also goes to Dean Thorn for October's 'Artist of the Month'.




Art Gifted and Talented Workshops for Foundation Students

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New Style Reports

The new style reports seem to have been generally well received by the students and you their parents. They were intended to be clearer and more informative. As this is a new system I have reviewed the correspondence from parents and met with some of our student ambassadors as well as consulting with staff. Some clarifications and some amendments would seem helpful at this stage prior to the next set of reports.

<u>Clarifications</u>

Colour Coding

The colour coding for the flagging of attainment has been described more clearly and flight paths have been reset in some instances.

The description on the back of the tracking report is changing from:

Students should aim to be on or within 2 fine grades of flight path in all subjects.

In Year 11 the red flags have also been moved to only flag when 7 or more fine grades below flight path rather than 5 or more which was the previous criteria and still used across Years 7 to 10.

Behaviour for Learning Codes

Alongside the initial behaviour for learning codes the following have now been added:

The following codes have been added:

- AW Amount of Work
- WQ Work Quality
- RL Rote learning and ability to memorise
- SW Show working more clearly

Please note WR will be phased out and replaced with AW and WQ.


I hope you have found the new style reports been helpful in identifying how your child is doing at Maiden Erlegh School.

Please remember you will find fuller subject specific feedback on your child's learning within their school exercise books or folders.

Flight Path Adjustments

The flight path starting points in Year 7 humanities have now been reset in order to better match the actual attainment grades determined by the teaching staff. Students will see new expected grades in Geography, History and Religious Education. This will mean less amber or red flags and more green and possibly some blue flags. The end point for KS4 GCSE has not been changed just the calculation that generated the expected starting point and, consequently the flight path in between for the journey through the next 5 years.

The flight path starting point in Year 9 Physical Education has been redefined. In the foundation stage all students are reported a PE assessment grade which is broadly determined by their ability to show the physical skills in the individual sports covered in the curriculum. In Year 9, only those continuing to study PE as an option to GCSE are reported. The assessment criteria for GCSE, while using the same fine numerical grades, are now more aligned with the student's academic ability. This could mean that the assessed PE grade at the start of Year 9 could be lower than the grade assessed at the end of Year 8.



The graphic above has been found useful in illustrating how the expected grades will enable a student to reach their benchmark in line with their ability.

Each flight path is individually tailored to each student.

A student's performance in the Year 6 SATS enables us to determine aspirational benchmarks in each subject. For this we use the Fischer family Trust student estimates. This determines the end point of the flight path.

A student's starting point on the flight path is either determined by their Year 6 SATS or by a baseline assessment depending on which is deemed the most helpful for that particular subject area.

The flight path is then modelled to enable the student to make steady but increasing progress towards their benchmark.
