From the Headteacher



I should like to welcome everyone back to school, staff and students, and especially all those who are new. Our new students have made a fabulous impression and are already working hard.

I must repeat how proud I am of the students who took exams this summer,

and the staff who taught and supported them. They did so well, and with such different and more challenging exams. The progress of the year groups was excellent, and boys, girls, and disadvantaged all made excellent progress overall. Well done to everyone again.

Over the next couple of weeks, I have the privilege of

seeing all the students in assemblies and talking to them about a number of things, but all of which boil down to some basics:

- 1. Do your best, no one expects perfection but doing the minimum will not lead to strong progress in these "terminal exams" (and will lead to greater pressure at exam times).
- 2. Be the best person you can be be kind, thoughtful and respectful of others, and yourself.
- 3. Seize the day take up the opportunities on offer here, push yourself out of your comfort zone a little (who knows what you might discover and what new friends you might make).

All is summed up, one way or another, by our two mottos: "opportunity, diversity and success for all" and "qui veut peut" (which I see as having a "can-do" attitude).

We are also having a bit of a litter-awareness drive. Young people generally are very environmentally aware and students are keen for us to work on "green" issues. On site we have little litter and our students are very good at using bins out and about, where they are available, but a small handful are still dropping litter and this has upset some of our neighbours. Please could you remind your child that they should bin their litter or take it home.

What is a teaching School?

Teaching schools give successful schools like Maiden Erlegh an important role in the training and

professional development of new teachers and qualified staff as well as contributing to the raising of standards through school-toschool support and Continuing Professional and Leadership Development. Maiden Erlegh School is a National Teaching School designated by the National College for Teaching & Leadership.

The Berkshire Teaching School (Berkshire TSA) is a teaching school based at Maiden Erlegh School, however we provide teacher training and development at various schools in the Berkshire area.



How does Berkshire **TSA** deliver teacher training?

The Berkshire Teaching School Alliance participates in the Schools Direct Programme of school-led training. We work with The University of Reading to deliver training, offering both salaried and unsalaried routes

You will have one lead school, and will spend time in a second school and gain a substantial amount of school-based experience

The school direct route leads to Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) with the option of studying for a PGCE.

Work of Art

Year 12 Art Students

In July some of our Yr12 Art & Design students went into Aldryngton Primary School to lead an afternoons Art workshop with 90 Yr1&2 pupils. In small groups they worked with the 3 classes, delivering a presentation about the work of Henri Matisse. The pupils then spent time drawing leaves from life and sea creatures from images and imagination. They then continued to produce cut outs in coloured paper linked to the cut out work of Matisse. Finally the pupils completed a communal collage of their work to display in each classroom.

Our students learned a lot about themselves and the skills needed to communicate ideas and information to others.

They enjoyed working with the KS1 pupils and some were natural teachers!





Before and After School

The vast majority of our students recognise that whilst wearing their Maiden Erlegh uniform that they are representing the school.

And for the vast majority of students, their behaviour before and after the school day reflects their pride in their community and school, and for that we thank you and them.

- When shopping at Tesco please do not stand/sit in groups in the car park or block the entrance, move on quickly so other students and members of the community can access the store.

On occasion we do receive complaints from our community about the behaviour of students outside school. We have a duty to support both the community, and the police, and we take very seriously any actions which will bring the name of the school into disrepute.
