




Cloudbusting


Told in verse, in first person, this is the touching story of an extraordinary friendship, that changes two boys lives for ever.

Neil Gaiman





The Diary of a Young Girl

In 1942, with Nazis occupying Holland, a thirteen-year-old Jewish girl and her family fled their home in Amsterdam and went into hiding. For the next two years, they and another family lived cloistered in the "Secret Annexe" of an old office building. Cut off from the outside world, they faced hunger, boredom, the constant cruelties of living in confined quarters, and the ever-present threat of discovery and death. In her diary, Anne Frank recorded vivid impressions of her experiences during this period. Her account offers a fascinating commentary on human courage and frailty and a compelling self-portrait of a sensitive and spirited young woman whose promise was tragically cut short.




The Ghost Behind the Wall




Granny was a Buffer Girl




Mortal Engines


Once


Black Beauty


Fire Bringer


The Boy Who Lost His Face


The Eagle of the Ninth


Flour Babies


His Dark Materials: Trilogy


The Hobbit


One More River


Refugee Boy

The "shooting war" turned out to be the horror of combat and the wild luck of survival: how it feels to cross a field toward the enemy, waiting for fire. When he entered the service he was a boy. When he came back he was different; he was only 19, but he was a man with "soldier's heart," later known as "battle fatigue."




Tersias


They all seek Tersias - but is he a force for good or evil? And can he ever rid himself of the dark spirit that torments his soul?

Deborah Ellis



Beverley Naidoo



Pete Johnson







The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time

Then she discovers the arched doorway into an overgrown garden, shut up since the death of her aunt ten years earlier. Mary soon begins transforming it into a thing of beauty--unaware that she is changing too. But Missalthewaite hides another secret, as Mary discovers one night. High in a dark room, away from the rest of the house, lies her young cousin Colin, who believes he is an incurable invalid, destined to die young. His tantrums are so frightful, no one can reason with him. If only, Mary hopes, she can get Colin to love the secret garden as much as she does, its magic will work wonders on him.</p>

	<p>The Knife of Never Letting Go Patrick Ness Todd Hewitt is the only boy in a town of men. Ever since the settlers were infected with the Noise germ, Todd can hear everything the men think, and they hear everything he thinks. Todd is just a month away from becoming a man, but in the midst of the cacophony, he knows that the town is hiding something from him --</p>

something so awful Todd is forced to flee with only his dog, whose simple, loyal voice he hears too. With hostile men from the town in pursuit, the two stumble upon a strange and eerily silent creature: a girl. Who is she? Why wasn't she killed by the germ like all the females on New World? Propelled by Todd's gritty narration, readers are in for a white-knuckle journey in which a boy on the cusp of manhood must unlearn everything he knows in order to figure out who he truly is.
