What students should bring Materials for sale from tutor	This day long course will act as an introduction to Cyanotypes, a photographic process using sunlight to produce blue prints, made famous by renowned botanist Anna Atkins. Experiment with different objects, images and techniques to create effective and unique art works. No experience of photographic techniques or darkrooms is required and everything will be covered from the first basic step. I am also happy to accept more experienced students who have already worked with this process but would like to create new work in an environment where they can access materials and ask for technical guidance. Digital images on a memory stick, old photographic negatives or physical photographs that could be scanned to create negatives on transparencies. Dijects or materials to expose. Things with different levels of transparency work well. Leaves or flowers (pressed/dried or flattened plants work very well) Source materials/ sketchbooks/ideas to work from
