

They also had to simulate the effect of an asthma drug and a placebo drug on asthmatic patients, collect the data and analyse it.

Success in Intermediate Maths Challenge



Over 60 students took part in the Intermediate Maths Challenge in February, mostly from Years 9, 10 and 11.

From this group, 16 Bronze certificates were awarded, 15 Silver and 6 gold.

Science Fair


On Tuesday 14 March, we held our annual science fair. Students worked incredibly hard researching different scientific concepts. They presented their work to members of staff, our school judge Mr Hawthorne and our guest judge Dr Nutt from University of Reading. The quality of students work was superb, the judges found it very difficult to choose a winner. Projects included research into antibiotics and the aging population, how electromagnets work, the ideal aeroplane, does colour affect the taste of food and the structure of the brain.



The winner of the foundation prize was Rachel Major from Year 7 who produced an excellent study into if music affects memory.









What I enjoyed the most, however, was watching the other presenters. They were all very different, discussing different piece of art, from classics such as Picasso to more contemporary work such as Lois Greenfield's photography of dancing figures. This huge variation in artworks allowed me to expand my knowledge on the world of art much more than I would have if I hadn't attended.
