

Quirks' Animal Roadshow - Yikes!

This term Year 7 students at Maiden Erlegh School have been studying tropical rainforests and how life has adapted to survive there. As part of this the students were visited by Luke Quirk from Quirks' Animal Roadshow. He introduced the students to the different animals found in each of the layers of the rainforest. These included White's tree frog found in the canopy; a Chinese water dragon found in the under canopy; and tarantulas and scorpions found on the forest floor. The students were excited to see how the animals moved around the rainforest and curious to learn how they hid from predators and hunted for their prey. The highlight of the show was meeting Mya the 8ft Burmese Python, who was a bit of a surprise to some students.

This was an incredibly valuable experience for students as it helped to reinforce the knowledge they have acquired in lessons. It also allowed them to have a deeper understanding of how animals have become adapted to their environment. This was an excellent opportunity which all the Year 7 students enjoyed. rainforest animals. They brought bird-eating tarantulas, scorpions, frogs, snails, a Chinese water dragon and a huge snake that was bigger than an adult and wasn't even fully grown yet! World Transplant Games - Grab Life with Both Handlebars!

We would like to say a huge congratulations to Luke Alexander, one of our sixth form students who has been selected to represent Great Britain at the World

Transplant Games held in Malaga, Spain in June.

Diagnosed with a rare and serious liver condition at just 10 weeks old

and having a life-changing liver transplant at 12 years old this teenager is an inspiration.

Luke will join 200 transplant athletes who have undergone similar surgeries to make up Team Great Britain and Northern Ireland, competing against over 1000 athletes from 70 countries in 17 different sporting events.

The games are the largest international organ donor awareness event, held every 2 years and supported by the International Olympic Committee.

Luke will be competing for his country in a 5km cycling time trial. He has done amazingly well to achieve this and should be very proud of himself.

Luke says:

"I am determined to do my best and hope to make everyone really proud when I compete at the World Transplant Games this year.

I am forever grateful to my donor and all the donor families for making that incredible life-saving decision at a traumatic time".

We are very proud of you Luke and wish you and all the team the very best at the games and look forward to hearing all about it when you return.

History Club's Public Speaking Challenge!

On Tuesday 9 May, Maiden Erlegh History Club staged a public speaking challenge on the topic of historical heroes and villains. The historians were

challenged to prepare speeches of up to three minutes, in which they must convince their audience that their chosen individuals were indeed the most heroic or villainous.

The students succeeded in giving a range of interesting

and persuasive speeches on heroes as diverse as Julius Caesar and David Cameron and villains as wideranging as Stalin and Winston Churchill.

All students should be congratulated not only for their courage in making

speeches in front of their peers, but for their ability to state a clear line of argument and support their views with evidence.



A special mention must go to Nirbhay

Kaul (Year 7), whose thoroughly researched speeches were particularly convincing.

Following the impressive speeches, the floor was opened up to a wider discussion about whether it is possible to compare heroes from different time periods with each other. This initial question led to some very thoughtful about comments importance of considering the context in which the individual lived and the difficulty in judging the short and long term impact of an individual and their actions.


