

The Maiden Erlegh Young Poets competition closed on Thursday 8 June and we had some fantastic entries making picking our top three winners very difficult indeed. We thoroughly enjoyed Ali Hill and Rebecca Chan's poems communicating the angst and emotion of love and coming of age, as well as Ester Ferreira's (Year 7) moving poem about the bond between sisters.

Alisha Bartlett and Aziz Mendy (both Year 7) made us smile with their whimsical and light-hearted poems, whilst Luke Worsley (Year 8) showcased his creative talents through his poem "Dark" exploring the sinister mask the world adopts when night falls. Zainab Malik from Year 9 made us question our bond with technology and wonder if we're all addicted in her poem and Carrie Whalley (Year 7) showed us the need to jump at every opportunity in "Life is Like a Locked Door".

Harvey Fraser (Year 8) made us wonder what we could write about "In the garden on a sunny afternoon" appealing very much to our love of the sun, whereas Ratul Vaish (Year8) took us on a doomed adventure where we were chased by a mystery monster in "The Claw Marks".

Ana Newell's "Stained Glass Churches" received third place for its haunting questioning of religion through sonnet form. Second place went to "Time" by Chris Starnes in Year 10 whose abstract poem about the relentless marching of time seemed to contain wisdom far beyond a fifteen year old. We also gave a special commendation to Amrit Manku from Year 12 for her amazing poem "Inspiration" about the key to freedom, displayed beautifully on a working clock face.

In first place, however, was a stark and somewhat dystopian poem about the dependence of today's society on technology. "Notification" by Atiya Chowdhury in Year 12 captured the growing need for constant social interaction through mobile phones and questioned whether we are really controlling the phones any more, or are they controlling us?

Well done everyone who entered, you should be incredibly proud of the work you submitted.

Year 7 Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Day

We are excited to be able to provide Year 7 with an insight into the world of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). Thales have kindly agreed to host the day on Monday 3 July where students will be exposed to a number of different STEM-related activities. Activities include Helicopter simulators, Oculus Rift and HTC Hive (computer science and virtual reality activities), Mars Rover (coding and

problem solving activities), Lego Minestorms and Ozbots, opportunities to meet current engineers to discuss career possibilities and entry requirements into STEM related professions, and two team work building challenges; 'geometric spaghetti towers' and a 'make it move' task. We hope that students have a really enjoyable day.

Foundation Food Workshop

We are keen to recognise and encourage the talents of all of our students. As a result, this term the Foundation Team organised a Gifted and Talented Workshop in Food. Twenty students were selected from Year 7 and 8 and we were lucky enough to secure the support of Christine Bailey, an award winning Nutritional Therapist, Chef, Author and Broadcaster with over 18 years of experience.

Christine talked to the students, demonstrated new skills and they cooked a healthy cupcake recipe. This was an excellent opportunity to work with someone

who has had great success in their field of work. Students transformed a traditional recipe into a healthy alternative and had the opportunity to cook with ingredients that they may not normally use.

Important Performing Arts Dates



Year 10 Cambridge Trip

On Wednesday 7 June, 40 Year 10s went to Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge. We arrived at around 10am and were promptly greeted with the grandeur of the 16th century grounds.

Within an hour we were acting as countries responding to a zombies pandemic. The USA and China put apart their differences to fight a combined response but both the UK and North Korea decided to brave the epidemic alone. This showed us the abstract thinking needed in a Cambridge subject and was led by a geography fellow.

We were shown around two colleges, greatly jeopardising each other. Sidney Sussex stood in a quite intimidating manner with many old buildings and apparently containing Oliver Cromwell's head. Robinsons, the other college, was possibly as imposing but was built from red brick and, having been constructed in the 1970s, was the newest built college. In Sidney Sussex there was a chapel built in the 1500s but Robinsons had a multi-faith room with modern stained glass, which they believed was more suited to today's society.

They showed the wide ranging culture in Cambridge and made this often clichéd place seem far more accessible to a group of state educated teenagers.



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
