I would like to say how proud I am of our community for their never-ending resilience and hard work during this period of school closure. I am sure they are all ready for a well-deserved break over the summer!








Covid-19 has provided a number of challenges to our school community, however it has also provided us with the opportunity to come together and support each other in a number of community led incentives.

One such incentive was through a Leighton Park School initiative, to help the NHS by providing laser cut Face Shields for front line staff working in Hospitals and Nursing homes and for use by Care organisations.

The plea for help came about when Leighton Park were unable to fulfil the overwhelming demand from medical and health sectors. A number of schools spanning all the way from




community's hour of need.

With the help of a TA member of staff to point us in the right direction, a Design Technology Technician and teacher, a Design Technology teacher at Maiden Erlegh in Reading and our headteachers Mr Paul Gibson and Mr Andy Johnson, the production of the parts for the face shields started.

Over 4 weeks during the lockdown and peak of the COVID-19 infection, just over 1000 face shields were created on the Design Technology Departments' Laser Cutters. Although Maiden Erlegh started production fairly late on, it was still a huge privilege to successfully contribute to the 32,000 face shields that were produced by the wider school community and a few local businesses.



We also had the opportunity to donate our science goggles to Woodley Centre GP Surgery, which were used by frontline staff as PPE supplies started to run low at the peak of the infection.








Fundraising Events

Earlier this year, before anyone realised the impact COVID19 was going to have on life as we knew it, we faced another challenge... a visit from Ofsted. This resulted in a verdict of 'outstanding' in all categories and the overall effectiveness of the school was also rated as outstanding.

I am incredibly proud as Headteacher of this wonderful school to share this news with you. The opening line of the report which states 'students receive an excellent education at this school' emphasises our success in achieving our core mission. The report also highlights that students are 'exceptionally well cared for' and that as a school we 'have the highest academic expectations of all students' highlighting our focus on, not only academic success but the wellbeing of the students. Our motto states that we will provide 'opportunity, diversity and success for all' and this report recognises the inclusive nature of our work across the school. As a comprehensive 11-18 school I am extremely pleased that the inclusive nature of our sixth form has been recognised, and that students with special educational needs enjoy their learning and 'achieve exceptionally well'. The latest inspection framework from Ofsted is extremely rigorous and focuses on the quality of education that students receive across the board. The inspectors looked at the breadth and ambition of curriculum and made reference to a wide range of subjects including the Arts which are an integral part of our school. The inspectors noted how motivated our students are and that they 'grow into confident, articulate individuals'. Behaviour is described as 'exemplary, both in and out of lessons'. I am incredibly proud of every student in #TeamMaidenErlegh. I would also like to praise the hard work of the staff at the school, which often goes unnoticed. I work with an incredibly talented and dedicated group of teachers and support staff who continually go above and beyond the call of duty for the students who come here. It is also important to note the support that Maiden Erlegh Trust have provided the school over past few years. This grade is a recognition of the work of the school every day and over time. Their expertise helps this school continue to grow and improve.

The centre currently caters for approximately 850 brothers and sisters for Jummah Prayer. However, it is currently undertaking extensive refurbishment and expansion to cater for its ever growing ummah (community).



The Islamic Centre's vision is for it to be a 'community hub' and a place that is vibrating, inviting, inspiring and transformational.

Part of this vision is to have a community garden, where people from all over Reading can come to learn about different plant species, ecosystems and environmental conservation.

Over the weekend of the 19-20 June, the Centre invited a range of individuals from the local area, including representatives from dif-



ferent faith backgrounds, nationalities and charity organisations (to name but a few), who came to the garden to plant a bush.
