GCSE and A Level Results

Year 11 Class of 2018 shines

All at Maiden Erlegh School are delighted with how our students have performed in last year's examinations. Students and staff have worked tirelessly to prepare for these new examinations, and their endeavours have paid off.

- 85% achieved at least a Grade 4 and 65% achieved at least a Grade 5 in both English and Maths.
- In English, **91%** achieved at least a Grade 4 and **80%** achieved at least a Grade 5.
- In Maths, 89% achieved at least a Grade 4 and 71% achieved at least a Grade 5.
- 37% of the grades on the new exams were Grade 7 or higher.
- 22% of the grades on the new exams were Grade 8 or 9 (with 20% Grade 8, 9 or A*).
- Overall our students gained 184 Grade 9 or A* (8%)

Mary Davies, Executive Headteacher said "These results come from the students' hard work, determination and talent, and of course the expertise and dedication of their teachers and support staff. I am delighted that all these endeavours have paid off and I am immensely proud of everyone"

A Level results build on last year's success

Maiden Erlegh School is once again delighted with how well our students have performed in this year's examinations. All their hard work has paid off and we are extremely proud of them.

This year continued to see the roll out of new and more challenging A Level specifications and our students have risen to the challenge again, improving on last year's performance. 53% of grades were between B and A* and 26% of A Level grades were A or A* (with 5% A*).

We would also like to thank the staff for all their hard work and expertise in teaching and supporting the students over the course of their studies. Mostly, however, we should like to congratulate all our sixth form students on their impressive results and wish them well for the future, wherever that will take them.

A year of positive Ofsted inspections for Maiden Erlegh Trust schools

2018 has been a very successful year for Maiden Erlegh Trust schools. Between 5-6 June Maiden Erlegh School in Reading received its first full Ofsted inspection. The school achieved "Good" in all inspection categories. This is a tremendous achievement in the short history of the school and we are very proud of the many positive comments in the report.

We were delighted to read that, "throughout the school, staff are hard-working and committed to ensuring pupils thrive, feel safe and gain the confidence they need to achieve" and that we have developed a "successful, engaging learning community". The report recognises our ethos is, "built on the values of equality and inclusion, leading to a culture of mutual respect and openness" and that "diversity and a sense of vibrancy permeate the school". The sense of ambition and vision for the school and the students is very clear, as is the value to the school of being a part of the Maiden Erlegh Trust.

Following on from this success, on 12 September 2018 Maiden Erlegh School received a one day inspection from Ofsted.

We are very pleased that Ofsted saw and have acknowledged the quality of our work here, not just academically but in terms of personal development and inclusion: "pupils make excellent progress across all areas of the curriculum and achieve GCSE results which are well above the national averages. This drive is well balanced with a clear commitment to the welfare of pupils and staff. Consequently, there is a very positive learning culture in the school. Pupils from a range of backgrounds thrive." We are hugely proud of our comprehensive ethos and to have our work validated in this way is tremendous.

Our Values Statement is clear that we will not be complacent and we remain committed to continuous improvement, including taking on board Ofsted's suggestion for "next steps". We look forward to welcoming Ofsted back soon for a further visit with the potential to improve our rating.

Student Voice visit to Wokingham Council Chambers

On Thursday 18 October, the student voice team represented Maiden Erlegh at its first Wokingham Borough Student Council meeting at the Council Chambers.

Students were treated to a talk about the democratic significance of Wokingham Borough Council by the Mayor. The discussion also included a talk on the future of Wokingham Borough Council and the work planned for coming years from the regeneration office, and a deliberation about the Wokingham Youth Parliament. This was a good opportunity for students to hear about their local area, and for them to have their say about what they would like – both for now and what would keep them here in the future.





A proposed new secondary school for north Reading

Reading Borough Council, like many local authorities, is facing increasing pressure on secondary school places and has recently announced its desire to increase secondary provision in the borough with a new school in the north of the town.

In order to respond to this need, Maiden Erlegh Trust are preparing an application to the Department for Education to open a new free school in north Reading. If the application is successful, the school will open to students in September 2021.

Maiden Erlegh Trust, like Reading Borough Council has high ambitions for the children it serves and welcomes this exciting opportunity to work with parents, the local community and the Council to create additional high-quality secondary school places in the local community.

Maiden Erlegh Trust, established in October 2014, is based in Reading and is well known for providing high-quality education for local communities. They have a successful track record and first-hand experience of opening a new free school in the borough. Maiden Erlegh School in Reading opened in September 2015, and is consistently oversubscribed. Its work was graded "Good" in all categories by Ofsted in June 2018.

Mary Davies, Chief Executive Officer of Maiden Erlegh Trust said "We are very excited by the potential of this project. Our ultimate aim is to create a school with, and for, the local community that responds to the ambitions of local stakeholders, including local schools and businesses. Maiden Erlegh Trust will listen carefully to the local community, in the same way we did when establishing Maiden Erlegh School in Reading. We will also work closely with Reading Borough Council to establish the new school should our bid to the DfE be successful."

We are delighted to confirm that our application to open River Academy has been submitted to the Department for Education. We are now waiting to hear whether we have been shortlisted for an interview, which is the next stage of the process and an opportunity to discuss our proposal in depth. Student Profiles

Arsalan Ali (2013)



Having passed my A-levels at Maiden Erlegh School in 2013, I soon found myself in a position of not knowing where to go next or what to do. Become a Accountant? Study Economics? Take a gap year? All these questions were going through my head until one day I (rather unexpectedly!) attended an aviation conference at Heathrow Airport. It was here I realised that maybe, just maybe I could have the best job ever!



Some kids want to be football players, others doctors, however since I was a kid, I was always interested in planes – even doing an Extended Project Qualification on the A380 (world's biggest commercial aircraft) during my time at the Sixth Form. Going through airports and seeing pilots in their sleek uniforms and smart travel cases heading onto their next adventure to another part of the world was so aspiring to me. I never looked up to any profession as I did pilots.

Having been given advice from the aviation conference at Heathrow, I decided to go to university where, whilst studying Air Transport Management, I took up flying lessons in a small Cessna 152 from a local flying club up the road from my university – in order to obtain my Private Pilot's Licence. Ever since my first flight, hearing the sounds of the engines spool up whilst I set take-off thrust on the runway, watching the ground rush past me and then suddenly floating seamlessly into the air and experiencing the world from 3000ft, I knew this was definitely the career choice for me. After gaining my PPL and graduating with a First Class Honours plus the Outstanding Achievement Award, I began focusing on what type of pilot I wanted to be; a Commercial Airline Pilot.



Having been accepted into a prestigious flying school based in Southampton I embarked on the journey. Initially passing 14 theoretical exams, I moved to Cyprus for 6 months to build some hours in another small aircraft, after which I moved back to the UK to fly slightly bigger aircraft out of Bournemouth, where I also eventually gained my initial Commercial Pilots Licence. After a further year of intense flight training, which included a few more theory exams and plenty of flying lessons, I was fortunate to receive a job offer (just before my 21st Birthday!) from Europe's Leading Airline – easyJet! From Lanzrote to Paris, I now fly all over Europe transporting hundreds of people on a daily basis in my £70m Airbus A320!




Despite the fact that even now, as a pilot you never stop learning, Maiden Erlegh gave me the building blocks of knowledge and skills not just academically, but socially, to be able to succeed in whatever field I chose. With great teachers always pushing me to become better, this has seen me accomplish something I would have never imagined a few years back. One of my favourite memories from school is being able to plan and film the 50th anniversary celebration event. It was a pleasure to be part of the school's history and celebrate this great occasion with former school students.

A piece of advice I would give to whoever is reading this. You may not know what you want to do next, but like I did, and as the saying goes 'do what you love and you'll never have to work a day in your life'. If becoming a pilot is your dream, I wish you all the very best. Training is an adventure yet the job really is the best in the world!

Since leaving Maiden Erlegh School in 2013, I first undertook a two year Extended Diploma in Animal Management at the Berkshire College Of Agriculture, for which I got three merits overall. I then went on to study at Reading College, where I undertook a Higher National Diploma in Computing and Systems Development and gained a Higher National Certificate from it.

Unfortunately during this time I suffered two consecutive bereavements, first my nan and then my father. However, even after these and a particularly hard module, I managed to gain an HNC.

I am now coming to the end of taking a year off, while learning creative writing for leisure and volunteering with charity shops.

Last year, in my gap year, I had the fortune of being involved in 5 projects, including a £73,000 budget show in Reading with Reading Between the Lines "Henry I". After that, I got involved with a smaller theatre company and we put on a small fringe piece in Reading, called *Peace*, which was awesome!

Following that, the 6 of us, dubbed Thee O Company, were commissioned to put on a 15 minute piece of street theatre based on Wind in the Willows. After that, I put myself forward to direct a production of *Hay Fever* with Thee O Company and we put that on in Woodley in August last year! Around that time, I also



met a local producer who was creating a pilot radio show called *The Cat in the Flat* and I appeared as the French waiter in it! It's going to be available in stores this winter!

After *Hay Fever*, I decided I wanted to push myself to be a higher and professional level actor and performer, and did a foundation year of vocational training at Read College, which started last September. This year has been incredible and I highly recommend it to students at Maiden Erlegh who wish to become actors - the foundation year there is an excellent way to bridge the gap between school and pushing students who want to go to drama school thereafter.

I have auditioned for lots of drama schools and have the wonderful honour of telling you that this September, I moved to Liverpool to do a 3 year BA in Acting at LIPA (Liverpool Institute of Performing Arts)! This school offers me everything I want in cultivating myself as an artist, writer, creator and performer! I look forward to continuing to take bigger and bigger steps in creating awesome theatre in the future!
