

Is there more past or future?





Careers, Work Experience, Work Related Learning and STEAM Provision

After a very busy new term, we would like to share with you some of the activities that have been going on as part of our careers, work experience, work-related and STEAM learning programme at Maiden Erlegh School. The purpose of our careers provision is to:

- Provide a differentiated and personalised learning programme that is appropriate to the student's needs and stage of career learning, planning and development.
- Provide impartial advice and guidance so that students are aware of the different destination routes available to them and how to get there.
- Develop work-ready skills so that students achieve satisfaction in the world beyond secondary school.
- Empower students so that they embark on a student-led programme.



Higher and Further Education Fair

On Friday 1 October we hosted our very first Higher and Further Education Fair in school to students in Years 10-13. The event was an overwhelming success as students had direct access to post-16 and post-18 guidance, support and information to support them in making key decisions about their future career journey and to help them to think through the different options available to them. A large number of universities, apprenticeship, training providers and gap year representatives were on hand to engage with Year 12 and 13 students as they start to think through their options in preparation for when they leave us. To support students in Years 10 and 11, we also invited a number of local colleges including Reading, Bracknell and Wokingham, Henley, BCA, UTC and also representatives from Maiden Erlegh Sixth Form so that students can gain the relevant information so that they feel fully informed about making appropriate decisions for life after Year 11.



Year 10 Work Shadow Day

We have recently launched the Year 10 Work Shadowing Day which will be held on Friday 24 June 2022. Students will be given the opportunity to spend a day in a company and experience a real working environment. This will provide students with an opportunity to observe, listen, ask questions to interact with relevant employers.

Year 11 Careers Conversations

We have begun our programme of careers conversations to students in Year 11. Each student will be offered a 30 minute bespoke interview with Karen Wray (our Careers Adviser) to explore appropriate destinations post -16. Students are provided with a personalised careers action plan and a student careers pack with information to follow up so that parents are able to discuss potential destinations at home.

The different options explored include:

Applying to Maiden Erlegh Sixth Form Applying to another secondary school Applying to a college Applying for an apprenticeship

We will also be delivering an apprenticeship awareness assembly in the near future to students so that they have all the relevant information about the different destination routes available to them so they are able to confidently make informed decisions about their futures. Activate Learning have already delivered an assembly to students, exploring the local college route.

Year 12 (and Year 13) Work Experience

We have recently launched work experience to students in Year 12 (and relaunched it to Year 13) as part of the 16-19 study programme. All students are expected to complete a 30 hour work experience placement which is directly linked to their chosen career aspiration. Students are to actively seek their own work experience placement by researching and contacting potential companies, going through the recruitment process e.g. completing application forms, CVs, interviews, completing a suitable placement. Students should also be actively applying to the wide range of virtual work experience placements that companies are currently offering, which are shared with students on a daily basis.





Houses of Parliament Trip



On Friday 15 October, our Year 12 Law students visited the Houses of Parliament, to give them a more detailed understanding of the English Legal System and Law Making in real life. With risk assessments, masks and social distancing all in place, we were pleased to explore our country's capital; highlights being a tour of the House of Commons and House of Lords. We asked questions such as, Does Parliament's supremacy still exist in light of EU influences? How do politicians debate key draft laws and issues? What does 'catching a Speaker's eye' mean? And many, many more!

We debated key issues ourselves during a workshop that the Education Centre provided and tested our prior knowledge in order to further cement our skill set in Law. The trip was eye opening and provided all attendees with a true experience of justice in action!




