# Careers, Work Experience, Work Related Learning and STEAM Provision

As we approach the end of this academic, we would like to share with you some of the activities which have been taking place as part of our careers, work experience, work-related and STEAM learning programme at Maiden Erlegh School.

#### **YEAR 9 – Careers Inspiration Day**

What a fantastic day was had by our Year 9 students on Friday 17 June when employers from Covea Insurance, Microsoft, Red10, Thales, and Thames Water visited our school. Representatives from the companies shared their career journeys and about the work they do, as well as supporting students as they created some fantastic career presentations using powerpoint. Students also enjoyed taking part in an enterprise activity in which they devised plans for as a business to create and run a prom event. As students worked in teams, shared and pitched ideas and presented their business model teachers and employer representatives observed. Well done Year 9 students! A big thank you to all the employer representatives, Miss Bateman who organised the day, Mr Buck and all teachers who supported this successful day.

#### **Year 12 Future Pathways Day**

On Friday 24 June, our Year 12 students took part in a Future Pathways event, which was designed to help our students make informed choices and decisions about their future at post 18. The day involved a carousel of workshops and presentations from Barclays, Reading University, Henley Business School, and our UCAS coordinator and tutors on writing a personal statement for University applications. Students experienced a 'Skills for Life' session, delivered by Barclays to give them an insight into what employers are looking for and advice on how to enhance their current skillset. In addition, we were fortunate to have academics from the University of Reading and Henley Business school deliver degree level subject specific presentations to our students. Current Reading University students also delivered a 'Day in the life of University Student' session, which shared with our students the challenges of university life, and included a myth busting session, as well as a 'what I wish I knew then' section, followed by an opportunity to ask questions. The day was very successful, and we are very grateful to our guest speakers for their time, support, and sharing their expertise, as well as Mr Gomm and Year 12 tutors who were an invaluable support throughout the whole day.

#### YEAR 7 - S.T.E.A.M. Day

On Friday 1 July Students in Year 7 participated in 4 STEAM-related activities run by representatives from Thales, Covea Insurance and Thames Water. Activities included an 'escape room' and a 'bin it, don't block it' session. More details to follow in the Spotlight newsletter.

#### YEAR 10 – Work Shadow Placement Day



## Religion and Philosophy

#### What is life like as a Buddhist?

During the week beginning Monday 27 June 2022, our Year 8 students had a very exciting Religion & Philosophy lesson where Robert Harrap, the director of SGI in the UK, came to talk to them about his Buddhist philosophy. Soka Gakkai International, is a form of Nichiren Buddhism which is focused on action to make the world a better place, such as by campaigning against climate change and supporting war torn countries. Throughout the session, Robert shared the core beliefs and practices behind Buddhism, and then students were given the chance to ask him questions about his worldview.



Robert taught us that in Nichiren Buddhism they believe that we all already have positive attributes such as courage, compassion, wisdom, and creativity within us, and the aim of this religious practice is to enable a person to reveal these traits so they can flourish. He said members of SGI will use the Lotus Sutra and chant 'Nam Myoho Renge Kyo' in order dispel the cloud of doubt, greed, ignorance, and hatred, so that they can recognise and reveal all the good traits we have. He explored the lovely imagery of the Lotus Flower to illustrate this idea. He said much like a lotus flower, which is so beautiful and ornate, can grow out of the mud and dirty water, humans can flourish despite our challenges and our suffering, if they recognise that those good traits are already within us.

During the session we had the pleasure of hearing him chant and subsequently, he was asked by a student how frequently he chants and whether at any point he has doubted his practice. He replied, everyone has waves of enthusiasm for everything they do but I have never doubted my practice. He said though chanting takes time out of your day, I find it always adds benefit. I loved his use of an arrow analogy to explain this. He taught, just like when you are firing an arrow, you pull the bowstring back to propel the arrow forwards, even though that seems counter intuitive. The more you pull the bowstring back, the further the arrow will go. He said that's just like chanting. The more you do, though it seems counter intuitive as it is time consuming, the more impact it will have on your life.

A massive thank you to Robert for taking the time to talk to our Year 8 students, giving us all a first-hand insight into his tradition's beliefs and practices.

#### Shikshak Vandan Diwas Celebration

On Friday 1 July, Miss Borthwick, Ms Aziz and I had the honour of attending Shikshak Vandan Diwas, translated as 'Teachers' Appreciation Day' which was held at Maiden Erlegh School in Reading by our local Hindu community. In Sanskrit, 'Shikshak' means teacher and 'Vandana' means utmost praise. Shikshak Vandan Divas is a Hindu celebration, where students are given the opportunity to offer respect and gratitude to their teachers. The Advayataraka Upanishads states 'A Guru is the highest wealth, greater than all else.' Therefore, within the Hindu tradition, a 'guru' or teacher has been highly revered and admired for centuries, and the local Hindu community wanted to show their thanks to teachers through a delightful evening of music, dancing and wonderful food.









HSS (UK) (<a href="https://hssuk.org/">https://hssuk.org/</a>) is a registered charity founded on the ethos of the Hindu values of Sewa (selfless service), Sanskar (life values & learning) and Sangathan (community spirit). In our local community, Hindu children of all ages attend weekly activities to develop soft skills like teamwork, leadership and confidence building, all leading to personal development, good citizenship and strong cultural values. As Miss Borthwick and I were the first to arrive, we were given the honour of lighting candles to start the celebration event. During the evening we were taught about how our local Hindu community helped during the pandemic and have recently supported those affected by the war in Ukraine. We also had the pleasure of watching a play performed by Primary School children who told the story of Shivaji Maharaj who showed loyalty and devotion to his Guru, Samarth Ramdas Swami. Finally, we were given delightful gifts by Maiden Erlegh student Devangi B in Year 7, as appreciation for the work we do. This included a plant in a hand painted plant pot, as a symbol of the role teachers play in nurturing and helping young people to grow and thrive. Teachers were then invited to speak, so I was honoured to be able to share a few words with those at the celebration. I hope I spoke for all the teachers present when I said that we are so grateful that this community has invited us to this special event and though this evening was to thank us, we really are the lucky ones. It is a privilege to be a teacher, to be given the responsibility of helping our young people grow

#### Can God Exist Alongside Evil?

On Tuesday 14 June, our Year 12 Philosophy and Ethics class was visited by RE Inspired, to give us a more detailed explanation surrounding the problem of evil from a Christian perspective. We welcomed Carrie King (RE Inspired leader), Revd Dr Philip Hobday (St Peter's Church) and Revd Stephen Ansa-Addo (Park United Reformed Church) who gave their unique perspectives on how to tackle the issue of God existing alongside evil. This felt like an even more pertinent discussion this year, in light of the suffering the pandemic has caused.

During the session, students were asked to interpret Christian, Muslim, and Jewish scriptures to determine beliefs about God. Then in light of these beliefs, students investigated theodicies (theories that attempt to solve the problem of evil), to try to determine that if God does exist, why God might have allowed evil and whether God could meaningfully hold these qualities alongside the existence of evil.
